## South Canterbury Art Society.

An Exhibition of Pictures and other Works of Art by Members will be opened in the Technical School Buildings on the evening of

All Works intended for exhibition must be delivered at the Technical School not later than 4 p.m. after which date no work will be received.

The Society will pay freight on pictures sent from other towns in New Zealand, will unpack and repack them free of charge, and will return them to the artists, carriage paid. Artists are requested to send their pictures by sea where possible.

All Works must be accompanied by a note, signed by the artist describing them as they are meant to be inserted in the Catalogue. At the back of each frame must be written the name and address of the artist, with the title and price of the picture and the number to which it refers in his list. The title and price of the picture, and the name of the artist must also be repeated on a label attached by a string to the top of each frame.

Commission on all sales effected will be charged as follows:—5 per cent. to members; 10 per cent. to all others. Members of other Art Societies are entitled to exhibit for sale without payment of any subscription.

Every possible care will be taken of works sent for exhibition, and they will be insured against fire, but the South Canterbury Art Society cannot hold itself responsible for any injuries which they may accidentally receive.

In order to assist in the disposal of artists' pictures, an Art Union will be held towards the close of the Exhibition. Winners of prizes may make their own selection of pictures.

Not more than eight different works will be received from any one artist.
